





The Liturgy of the Word

FIRST READING: Jeremiah 31:31-34

God declared that a new day was coming when he would make a new covenant with Israel and Judah, a covenant unlike the one made with the patriarchs of the faith and the slaves of Egypt. The first covenant was broken by a disobedient people who refused to obey God's law. This covenant will be written on the hearts of the people.

³¹{Thus says the LORD,} "Behold, the days are coming, declares the LORD, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah, ³²not like the covenant that I made with their fathers on the day when I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt, my covenant that they broke, though I was their husband, declares the LORD. ³³For this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, declares the LORD: I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts. And I will be their God, and they shall be my people. ³⁴And no longer shall each one teach his neighbor and each his brother, saying, 'Know the LORD,' for they shall all know me, from the least of them to the greatest, declares the LORD. SECOND READING: Hebrews 5:1-10

Those who were appointed as high priests in Israel still had to make sin offerings for their own sins as well as for the sins of others in the community. Jesus, who was perfect, was designated by God as a high priest according to the order of Melchizedek — both king and priest. His offering was made through prayers and supplication while on earth. His final sacrifice of his life granted us eternal life.

¹For every high priest chosen from among men is appointed to act on behalf of men in relation to God, to offer gifts and sacrifices for sins. ²He can deal gently with the ignorant and wayward, since he himself is beset with weakness. ³Because of this he is obligated to offer sacrifice for his own sins just as he does for those of the people. ⁴And no one takes this honor for himself, but only when called by God, just as Aaron was. ⁵So also Christ did not exalt himself to be made a high priest, but was appointed by him who said to him, "You are my Son, today I have begotten you"; ⁶as he says also in another place, "You are a priest forever, after the order of Melchizedek." ⁷In the days of his flesh, Jesus offered up prayers and supplications, with loud cries and tears, to him who was able to save him from death, and he was heard because of his reverence. ⁸Although he was a son, he learned obedience through what he suffered. ⁹And being made perfect, he became the source of

eternal salvation to all who obey him, ¹⁰being designated by God a high priest after the order of Melchizedek.

HOLY GOSPEL: Mark 10:35-45

Jesus taught his followers that just as Moses lifted up the bronze serpent in the wilderness to save the Israelites from death, so too must the Son of Man be lifted up.

This lifting up of Jesus would occur on the cross of Calvary. All who believe in him are destined for life eternal. This is God's gift to those who love him.

But whoever would be great among you must be your servant, ⁴⁴and whoever would be first among you must be slave of all. ⁴⁵For even the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many."

(Gluten-free hosts are available by telling the person giving the host.)


Private prayer before receiving Holy Communion:





MUSIC NOTES

"Interlude on St. Flavian" - arr. Stanley E. Saxton

ST. FLAVIAN is the tune for today's Hymn of the Day, "Lord, Help Us Walk Your Servant Way." The text for this hymn by Herman Stuempfle (1923-2007) exhort's Christ's followers to identify with Him who came not to be served but to serve others. Stuempfle wrote the hymn in 1994 and published it in his 1997 collection Redeeming the Time. In that publication, Stuempfle noted Mark 10:35-45 and John 13:1 -7, 31b-35 as the biblical bases for the hymn. He also included a quotation from Bernard of Clairvaux: "Learn the lesson that, if you would do the work of a prophet, what you need is not a scepter but a hoe."

"Glory Be to Jesus" - arr. Malcolm Archer

The Italian antecedent of this text ("Viva! Viva! Gesù!") was found in an 1837 edition of Galli's Raccolta di Orazione e pie Opere colle Indulgenze. Earlier (1815) Pope Pius VII had granted a 100-day indulgence to all who used the hymn. The translation by Edward Caswell first appeared in his Hymns for the Use of the Birmingham Oratory (1857), entitled "Hymn to the precious blood."

"The Shepherd's Complaint" - Felix Mendelssohn

Jakob Ludwig Felix Mendelssohn Bartholdy (1809-1847), widely known as Felix Mendelssohn, was a German composer, pianist, organist and conductor of the early Romantic period. His compositions include symphonies, concertos, piano music, organ music and chamber music. His best-known works include the overture and incidental music for A Midsummer Night's Dream (which includes his "Wedding March"), the oratorio Elijah, the melody used in the Christmas carol "Hark! The Herald Angels Sing", and his Songs Without Words for piano.

"The Lord Is My Shepherd" - arr. John Rutter

This sacred choral composition by John Rutter is a setting of Psalm 23. The work was first published in 1978 by Oxford University Press. Rutter composed it for Mel Olson and the Chancel Choir of the First United Methodist Church in Omaha, Nebraska. He later included the work as a movement in his Requiem of 1985. In 1993, Rutter also made it part of his Psalmfest, a collection of nine psalms written over 20 years.

"Verses from the Te Deum" - Anonymous

Printing of music began about the middle of the 15th century, and early in the next century a man named Pierre D'Attaignant was the first person in France to print music from movable type. D'Attaignant published a large collection of pieces by many composers. This is a setting of the traditional hymn of rejoicing "Te Deum" – "We Praise Thee, O God" and contains five verses. The composer is not known.
