

A Note from Pastor Wendel



Ash Wednesday and Lent at Grace Ev. Lutheran Church!

4 But God, who is rich in mercy, out of the great love with which he loved us, 5 even when we were dead through our trespasses, made us alive together with Christ; by grace you have been saved... Ephesians 2:4-5

Christians have long described Ash Wednesday as the "door" through which we enter the season of Lent! Ash Wednesday calls to mind the words of the Lord God to Adam and Eve, after they had sinned. As the Lord was speaking to them words of judgement as the consequence of their disobedience, he reminded them, "you are dust and to dust you shall return." It was (and is!) a stark and sobering word to us as the Lord God calls to mind our mortality and the result of sin is death. At the same time, it is a call to repentance, renewal and transformation as we journey through the season of Lent, on our way to Holy Week and Easter.

Often, Lent can be misunderstood. Folks think of Lent as dark, depressing, negative as the focus is thought to be on our sinfulness. While Lent is a season for reflection upon our sin, that reflection is always for the sake of absolution and new beginnings! Our brief order for confession at the beginning of each worship service is always, always for the sake of forgiveness, so that we may worship and live anew as the redeemed people we are!

For this reason, to be reminded that Ash Wednesday and Lent are first and foremost about "grace," our theme for our journey to Holy Week and Easter will be "Amazing Grace!" with our theme verse from Ephesians, "By grace you have been saved!" In our services, we will focus on and emphasize that the ashen crosses we receive on Ash Wednesday, the reflection and renewal we seek during Lent are all possible only because of God's "Amazing Grace!" I will be preaching on Sundays during Lent and Molly will offer homilies on the theme at Wednesday midweek Lenten services. Please join with our congregational community for our Lenten observance, and consider inviting others to come, share God's amazing grace with us!

Ash Wednesday, Feb. 14:

7:30 AM: Simple spoken service of confession with imposition of ashes. This service will be approx. 20 minutes in length, providing those who desire to receive the imposition of ashes at the beginning of the day. It will not be a preaching service, nor will there be Holy Communion.

12:15 PM: Simple spoken service of Word and Sacrament with sermon, Holy Communion and imposition of ashes. This midday service is provided for those who may be unable to attend the full evening service. It may be especially helpful for those who would like to worship on Ash Wednesday but prefer not to drive or leave home in the evening.

7:00 PM Ash Wednesday service of Word and Sacrament with imposition of ashes, sermon, music and Holy Communion.

> Wednesday Mid-week Lenten observances: Feb. 21 - March 20 6 PM Soup Suppers 7:00 PM Holden Evening Prayer

Work toward the expansion of the existing Columbarium is now moving forward. The granite has been delivered to the United States, and is currently being fabricated into the monuments to be delivered to Grace. The original 35 niches of our columbarium are all sold. The new expansion will add 70 niches. Members will be able to begin the niche acquisition process approximately March 1 once all of the final construction steps and costs have been finalized.

Plans have been put into motion to renovate and update the wall sign at the intersection of Schrock and Otterbein. The present brick and stone monument will be preserved, with new aluminum letters replacing the current ones, and an electronic message center will be added pending the approval of local zoning officials.

Reminder - Mission Funds Available



The 13 attendees, including 3 first timers, were treated to coffee and dessert prepared by Twyla Ridder while Shirley Hodeck shared her experience and some pictures of delivering the group's donation of dresses and shorts to Little Dresses for Africa in Rockwood, Michigan.

The value of Bible study?

Christianity was never intended to be a spectator sport, Bible study is not just valuable, it is invaluable. Group study is so effective that Jesus used it to train the men who would be known as the apostles (Luke 6:12–16; Mark 4:34).

Christianity is meant to be relational first, on a vertical axis between ourselves and God and, second, on a horizontal axis between ourselves and those around us. Bible study groups move us from being spectators in the church service to active participants in a like-minded community dedicated to spiritual growth.

In Bible study we encounter God's Word together, we have an opportunity to share our different perspectives and insights and are broadened because of the interaction. More information is retained when there is active involvement, so biblical literacy is enhanced. Application and accountability bring understanding that moves God's Word from the intellect to the heart. Transformation is encouraged (Romans 12:2), and our lives are changed. When our lives are changed, the lives of those around us are changed as well.

Our Bible study can be a place to celebrate life's victories, get prayer support, be encouraged in tough times and keep ourselves accountable in our personal growth. Bible studies offer a structured time to focus on topics that address our needs or interests. They offer an enlivening arena to help carry us from Sunday to Sunday and a safe place to work out the challenges we face.

Believers are the Body of Christ (Romans 12:5); as such, we are His hands and feet on earth, the ones who will continue His work. First Corinthians 12:4–12, Romans 12:4–8, and Ephesians 4:11–13 list the gifts given to the Body. Bible studies are where many people begin to identify and express those gifts. As we gain in our knowledge of the Bible and deepen our relationship with God and other believers (Colossians 2:7), we become better equipped to live and share the gospel with those in our schools, neighborhoods, and workplaces.

Our commitment to a Bible study is a model to those around us. It is evidence that we value our spiritual growth enough to invest time in it. Our children are watching our actions, and they gain firsthand knowledge of what it means to be a follower of Christ and honor the Word. They benefit from our commitment because they see us walking our talk, working out our salvation (Philippians 2:12).

God designed us to need Him and each other. His word to us is to reach out and love one another. Colossians 3:16 says we should allow "the message of Christ [to] dwell among you richly as you teach and admonish one another with all wisdom through psalms, hymns, and songs from the Spirit, singing to God with gratitude in your hearts." What better place for that than in a Bible study?

Jim Caldwell Heading to Prison - Again

Last March, you, the wonderful cookie bakers of Grace, made 190 DOZEN cookies that made their way to the North Central Correctional Complex in Marion, Ohio. These cookies were a part of the 8500 dozen cookies distributed to the residents during the



Kairos Ministry Weekend. Jim Caldwell reports that the joy that these cookies bring to the complex is an amazing blessing. Your cookies and your prayers on behalf of the residents and the Kairos volunteers are very much appreciated .

Jim is headed back to the prison on March 14 to the 17th. He is counting on the Grace cookie bakers again this year.

Cookies for Kairos Guidelines

Thank you for volunteering to bake Kairos Cookies! Following these guidelines will help ensure that your cookies will be most effectively used to do the work for which God inspired you to bake.

Make your cookies sturdy. They will need to be handled several times before they arrive in the prisoners' hands. Delicate, pretty cookies will crumble. Chewy cookies and brownies tend to end up as a single large featureless lump.

- Chocolate chip cookies are always a popular choice. If chocolate chip cookies are not possible, snicker doodles and peanut butter are also popular.
- Size Try to make the cookies 2 to 3 inches in diameter. Consistent size is important.
- 2 dozen per bag in a one gallon bag. Please count your cookies carefully. Any bag with other than 2 dozen needs to be marked. (*Please Note: This is a change. Previously we asked for only 1 dozen per bag. Now it is 2 dozen per bag.*)
- No powdered sugar, frosting, or raisin cookies. Chocolate chips, M and M's and Reese's pieces are fine.
- Do not put notes in the bag or on the bag. We will have to remove them before the cookies go into the prison.
- Please use zip-loc bags to keep the cookies as fresh as possible.
- Do not use burned or blemished cookies. Remember the cookies are intended to represent God's unconditional love to the prisoners.
- Cookie mixes and pre-mixed dough from the store are fine.
- Pray. As you bake the cookies, pray for the inmates who will receive them. Your prayers are very important to the prisoners.

What Is Lent All About, and Why Is It Important?

Lent is the 40 days (not including Sundays) from Ash Wednesday to the Saturday before Easter. Lent is a time of preparation, an opportunity to go deeper with God: A time for personal reflection to prepare our hearts and minds for Good Friday and Easter.

What Are the Key Days During Lent?

Ash Wednesday is the first day of Lent. You may have noticed people with a smudged, black cross on their foreheads. Those are ashes from the Ash Wednesday service. The ashes symbolize our grief for the things we've done wrong and the resulting division of imperfect people from a perfect God.

Maundy Thursday is the day before Good Friday. It commemorates the night before Jesus died, when He shared the Passover meal with His closest friends and followers.

Good Friday is the day Christians remember Jesus' death. The "Good" reflects how Jesus' death was a sacrifice on our behalf so we can receive God's forgiveness for our wrongs or sins.

Easter Sunday is the joyful celebration of Jesus rising from the dead to give us the opportunity of eternal life. While people still die, Jesus made the way for people to have a relationship with God in this life and to spend eternity with Him in heaven.

What Happens During Lent and Why?

The three main things people focus on during Lent are prayer, fasting (abstaining from something to reduce distractions and focus more on God) and giving or charity. **Prayer** during Lent focuses on our need for God's forgiveness. It's also about repenting (turning away from our sins) and receiving God's mercy and love.

Fasting, or giving something up, is a very common practice during Lent. The idea is that giving up something that's a regular part of life, like eating dessert or scrolling through Facebook, can be a reminder of Jesus' sacrifice. That time can also be replaced with more time connecting with God.

Giving money or doing something good for others is a way to respond to God's grace, generosity and love. For example, some people spend time volunteering or donate money they would normally use to buy something, like their morning coffee.

It's important to note that doing these things can never make us earn or deserve Jesus' sacrifice or a relationship with God. People are flawed and will never be good enough for a perfect God. Only Jesus has the power to rescue us from ourselves.

Jesus sacrificed Himself on Good Friday to bear the punishment for all our wrongdoings and offer us forgiveness. He was raised from the dead on Easter Sunday to give us an opportunity to have a relationship with God for eternity.

Spending time during Lent praying, fasting and giving can make Jesus' sacrifice on Good Friday and His resurrection on Easter even more meaningful.

Luther on the Practice of Indulgences

In Luther's day, the whole church of western Europe was subject to the authority of the pope in Rome. Pope Leo X was the son of a wealthy Italian family, the House of Medici. He was known for his extravagant tastes and gratuitous spending. Pope Leo undertook the task of renovating St. Peter's Basilica in Rome, hiring the best craftsmen and artists to make his dream a reality. But all this required money. Leo decided to use the common practice of "indulgences" as a means of raising funds for the project.

As Luther had experienced during his visit to Rome, indulgences were already a popular institution. Originally, indulgences were certificates issued by the church to recognize significant acts of penance, such as undergoing a pilgrimage or performing a work of humility. Such acts were understood to merit special pardon and favor from God.

In the theology of the time, a distinction was made between the guilt of sin (which could be forgiven) and the subsequent penalty that sin incurred, which had to be "worked off" by acts of penance. If a person died without having satisfied this requirement, they would have to spend time in a place called "purgatory" to complete their penance and be purged of their impurity. Indulgences were said to reduce this penalty by drawing on the surplus grace earned by the saints of old.

In the service of his ambitions, Pope Leo began offering special papal indulgences throughout the lands of Europe on the basis of cash donations. Not only were

these "plenary" indulgences (meaning they had the power to remit all penalties), but these indulgences could also be purchased on behalf of the dead, effectively freeing them from their entire sentence in purgatory. As a result, a great deal of wealth came into the papal coffers.

In German lands, one of the most notorious sellers of these indulgences was a man named Brother John Tetzel. A friar of the Dominican Order, he was described as being not too bright, but good at his job of raising money. A fire-andbrimstone preacher, Tetzel played on people's fear of death and hell. People flocked to buy indulgences that promised to free them from the debt incurred by their sins.

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Tetzel's promise to those who worried about loved ones trapped in purgatory was just what they wanted to hear. "As soon as the coin in the coffer rings, the soul from purgatory springs!"

When Luther heard of what Tetzel was doing in neighboring districts and how the friar was preying on the fears of the poor, he worried about the pastoral implications, especially the bad theology that it conveyed to the masses. Luther thought it necessary to have a public discussion of the practice of indulgences among the local clergy and

theologians in Wittenberg.

The legend is that on October 31, 1517 A.D., the Eve of All Saints' Day (November 1), Luther nailed 95 statements of debate to the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg, which was the place where public notices were posted in the community. This document, known as the "95 The-

ses," was written in Latin and intended for scholarly debate at the university. But the theses were quickly translated into common German. Because of the new technology of the printing press, Luther's arguments against indulgences—and the pope's lack of wisdom and authority in issuing them—soon began spreading throughout all of Germany.
