

HOLY WEEK SCHEDULE AT GRACE





On Shrove Tuesday, February 13, after the pancake supper, worshipers gathered on the portico and burned palm branches from last Easter. The ashes of these palms were used to make the sign of the cross on their foreheads the next day, Ash Wednsday.



These ashes are a sign for us as a people of God that we are forgiven and restored in Christ Jesus our Lord. When we hear the words, *"Remember you are dust and to dust you shall return,"* we are reminded of God's mercy in our lives. He who created the universe with a word, also spoke each of us into existence, to live in blessed union with him and with one another.

While you will receive this Voice newsletter early in March, because Easter is early this year, the Holy Week will conclude with Easter on March 31st! It's hard to believe we are approaching the Third Sunday in Lent, but time marches on, and life seems to move at a dizzying pace! For this reason, not only is this the time to announce our upcoming Holy


Week services, but now is also the time to consider spreading the word about our services, especially those marking the Holy Triduum, or Holy Three Days which include Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter Sunday!

Palm/Passion Sunday, March 24 (8:15 and 11:15 AM) begins the Great and Holy Week, as we hear again the processional Gospel describing the triumphal entry into Jerusalem, with the focus shifting with the chanting of the Passion of our Lord according to St. Mark, ending the service with our crossing the threshold into Holy Week.

Maundy Thursday, March 28 (12:15 PM and 7 PM services) comes from the Latin word, mandatum or "command,"

marking the Lord's command to "Do this for the remembrance of me," with His institution of the Lord's Supper, as well as His command for His disciples to love one another as I have loved you, illustrated by His washing of feet, but also the command for disciples to forgive as we've been forgiven! A 12:15 PM spoken service will again be offered for those who prefer, with full service with music and singing at 7 PM.

Good Friday, March 29 (12:15 PM and 7 PM services) will focus on a service of Tenebrae (Shadows) as the church is progressively darkened with prayers and readings marking the Biblical Way of the Cross, beginning with Jesus in agony in the Garden of Gethsemane, ending with Jesus' burial and the sealing of the tomb, at which point a single candle remains lighted and is carried from the sanctuary, symbolizing the earth in darkness as the Lord is no longer alive in the world. The candle is returned to the sanctuary after a time, reminding worshipers that death isn't the last word, but that the Light of Christ isn't extinguished but will shine on Easter morning!

Easter Sunday, March 31 (8:15 AM and 11 AM services) We will celebrate the Resurrection of our Lord with a festive service of Word and Sacrament, with brass ensemble and choir! Easter breakfast (9:30-10:45 AM) is coordinated by Youth and Family Ministry, with proceeds supporting our annual Vacation Bible School! During the sermon time at both services, younger children who wish may depart the sanctuary for an age-appropriate story, <u>'Twas the Morning of Easter!</u>

While every Sunday of the church year is a celebration of the resurrection, Holy Week and Easter services are particular times when those who are unchurched or are inactive consider attending services. As with Christmas, we will again be making invitations available which you may wish to share with friends, family or neighbors, informing them of our Holy Week worship times! We are moving forward as a congregation with excitement, energy and enthusiasm! Many unchurched or inactive folks would attend a worship service, if invited! Studies show that these persons are waiting for someone to simply invite them to "come and see!" People often ask why mega churches seem to be growing leaps and bounds, while our church isn't. The difference is that those in mega-churches are often excited about their mission and ministry and so can't wait to invite others, while Lutherans aren't used to doing that! The printed invitations to Holy Week services provide an easier and maybe more effective way to invite others to come worship with us at Grace, where we experience and celebrate our "Awesome God," who saves us because of His "Awesome Grace," and we respond with "Awesome Worship!"

The printed Holy Week invitations will be available beginning Sunday, March 10!

Carmel Street Medicine team is a comprehensive team of healthcare professionals, including a family practice physician, family nurse practitioner, psychiatric nurse practitioner, registered nurses, medical technicians, bilingual case workers, and community paramedic who are prepared to provide the most needed care and support. The Street Medicine program is a vital part of Franklin County's healthcare safety net, providing free quality care to more than 6,000 uninsured and under-insured patients annually. The goal of the team is to reduce unnecessary emergency department visits, and to support and empower community members to create a more vital, harmonious, and sustainable life.

The Rice Bowl organization partners with children's homes to help provide locally sourced meals. Their mission is to feed orphaned children around the world.






YARN MATTERS



Grace Altar Guild Members Work Behind the Scenes

A newcomer in the sacristy at Grace on a Saturday morning would hear perhaps unfamiliar words being spoken, like: "*Ciborium, Purificator, Paten, Chalice, Credence, Pall, Font and Flagon*". Those spoken words means that several Altar Guild team members have arrived and will spend the next hour in the little room behind the altar doing a vital ministry of the church; that of preparing the Eucharist for the following day.

They begin their duties by dusting the pastor's tables and chairs, lecterns, altar, organ, organ stand and piano. They then wipe the sacristy counters with antiseptic wipes. After cleaning, they wash their hands, don rubber gloves and begin the work of preparing the Eucharist and setting the credence table. This is the beginning.

The next morning, after the 8:15 service has concluded, the Altar and Credence table is cleared and reset for the 11:00 o'clock service. Finally, at the end of the second service, the cleanup of everything takes place and all items are washed and readied for the next Saturday morning.

Two members of a team of eight or nine members, take their turn fulfilling these weekly responsibilities. Our Altar Guild at Grace has 30 members, divided into 3 teams. Each team handles a month of Altar duty every three months.

On Saturday, Feb 3, 2024, Altar Guild members met in the Loaves and Fishes Cafe to review team assignments and go over the updates that need to be taken. Vanessa Stewart, who heads up this ministry, reviewed the assignments, went over changes and ironed out the intricacies of the procedures.

The session was preceded by a 'light' breakfast and fellowship. It is good to know that Grace has dedicated individuals willing to administer this necessary and Holy mission for us. 

Sixth in a series of 11 articles on the Reformation by Pr. Tom Jacobson - Southeastern Ohio Mission **District Dean**

Martin Luther's Translations

Martin Luther and his colleagues in Wittenberg, Germany sought to reform the Church of their time by refocusing it on the central message of the faith, which they felt had been obscured by other and unnecessary things. They wanted to refocus the Church on faith in Jesus Christ as savior and our faith in that good news. By placing this faith at the center, they felt that everything else would fall into its proper place.

The time of the Reformation was about a lot more than one person called Martin Luther. Many others contributed to the work, and without their assistance, Luther would not have been successful. In time, I will write more about some of the other significant figures of the Reformation. However, Luther's life in itself provides a great deal to chew on.

In this article, I want to talk about Luther's writings, specifically his translations. Luther was a prolific writer. It is said that if you count out all of the letters, documents, and translations he composed in his career and average them out over his entire life (including his childhood), Luther wrote on average two documents a week! Kind of like the internet today, the printing press in Luther's time allowed for documents to be disseminated and ideas to spread much more quickly than in the past. There is a legend that says that Luther, in a time of spiritual and mental depression, thought that the devil had appeared in his room, at which point Luther picked up his inkwell from this desk and threw it at him. This legend is based on a comment he made later in his life: "I have thrown ink at the devil." What he meant, however, was that he was fighting the work of the devil through the ink put on paper in the form of his letters, catechisms, sermons, treatises and Bible translations.

One part of Luther's legacy that is often overlooked is that of his work as a Bible translator. When Luther was held captive for his own safety in the Wartburg Castle in 1521 for eight months, he used that time to produce a German language translation of the New Testament. It is important to remember that Luther's translation was not the first German translation of the Bible. There were in fact fourteen translations of the Bible in German before Luther. But Luther's translation was significant because it was the best. The older translations were clunky and not easily understood by the people. Luther wanted a Bible translation that could be read or heard and understood. For that reason, Luther did not attempt to create a "word for word" translation from Greek (of the New Testament) and Hebrew (of the Old Testament). Instead, Luther's guiding principle of translation was "meaning for meaning." For him, it was necessary first to understand the point of the original language and then put that into the clearest German possible.

Luther's work paid off. His translation soon became widespread and popular. It is important to understand that even with the printing press, books in Luther's time were expensive, and most people could not afford their own Bibles. Many congregations themselves could not afford a Bible. But Luther's translation soon became normative, and it also became the basis for the modern German language. The influence of Luther's German Bible for German speaking lands can be compared to how the King James Version of the English Bible of 1611 has influenced modern English.

A few years after the New Testament came out, Luther translated the Old Testament, and the entire German Bible was published in 1524. Luther took great care in his translation. When translating the Hebrew language from the Old Testament book of Leviticus, for example, there are many places that refer to the Israelite law involving animal sacrifice and animal organs. To make sure he was translating the Hebrew words correctly, he went to the local butcher and asked him to give him the German words for the various animal organs.

Translating the Bible (or anything, really) from one language to another is challenging. But Luther reminds us that the main point is not simply translating things "word for word." No translation of the Bible can be completely word for word and still make sense in English or any other language. It is the meaning of the original that matters, and we seek to express that meaning in our own languages to this day.

One final note regarding Luther's translations: In the text of the Apostles' and Nicene Creeds, it says toward the end in the original Greek and Latin that "I believe in the holy catholic Church." Luther (and actually others before him) decided that the best way to express the meaning of that word "catholic" was to translate it as christlich, meaning "Christian" in German. The word "catholic" simply means "universal" or "wide ranging." It meant that the Christian faith was not something that only one group in one place held, but rather that the Church of Jesus Christ exists everywhere people have faith. It also meant that true Christians believe in the whole message of the faith instead of only one part of it. Luther's decision to write "the holy Christian Church" is one example of his "meaning for meaning" principle of translation.

Luther's legacy goes far beyond religion, and many people in Germany today have an appreciation of him for things beyond his faith. Luther's impact on the modern German language through his translation of the Bible is one example of the far reaching influence that Martin Luther had on his own land and the rest of the world.
